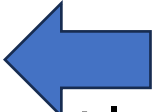

Stakeholder Groups to Engage

All stakeholder engagement activities/initiatives should be inclusive and involve as diverse a group of participants as possible. It is critical to empower stakeholders who have been historically underrepresented and underserved in this work.

- Students
- Parents and guardians who are reflective of the student demographics served by the district
- **Community members** 
- Teachers (e.g., teachers at large, by content or subject, etc.)
- Principals (e.g., principals at large, by level or school model, etc.)
- Teachers' Association
- Principals' Association
- Other bargaining units
- Librarians
- Counselors
- Non-teaching professionals
- Education support professionals
- Local school board
- College and career readiness partners from industry and institutions of higher education
- Community partners (e.g., partners providing wraparound services)
- Early Childhood partners and private child care providers

Why Community Engagement?

- Ensure that the district's plan to achieve the Blueprint's intended outcomes **aligns with community needs**
- Gather input and feedback from individuals **directly impacted by the Blueprint** that can lead to more effective and innovative implementation solutions
- Cultivate critical **local support** for the Blueprint's implementation

Types of Community Engagement

Community Engagement Spectrum

Increasing level of public impact

INFORM

Provide residents with info and assist in understanding problems, alternatives, and solutions.

CONSULT

Obtain public feedback on analysis, alternatives, and decisions.

INVOLVE

Work directly with residents and consistently consider their concerns and aspirations.

COLLABORATE

Partner with residents in decision-making, including in identification of solutions.

EMPOWER

Residents are making decisions and leading solution-based efforts.

Examples of Engagement

- Share opportunities to engage with the Blueprint through existing events/meetings (neighborhood or city council meetings, religious/civic organization meetings, festivals/fairs, school events)
- Large group meetings/town halls
- 1:1 meetings
- Focus groups
- Surveys
- Information sessions/webinars

Challenges to Community Engagement

- Large number of stakeholders to engage across a wide array of policy areas
- Tight implementation timeline
- Responding to input/feedback that would require a legislative change to address

Best Practices

- Share and shift power to community members by listening to what they have to say
- Ensure that individuals participating in planning or implementation activities reflect the community you serve
- Eliminate accessibility and language barriers to participation
- Be upfront about potential challenges/limitations to addressing community feedback

Community Engagement with Developing the Initial BCP

- Implementation Planning Series (4 sessions)

 - Archived on AIB website
- Blueprint Public Working Sessions (9 sessions)
 - 3 sessions per pillar
 - Livestreamed and open to members of the public to attend and contribute input via Zoom

Community Engagement with Developing the Initial BCP

- Public Feedback on Draft Blueprint Comprehensive Plan
 - Released draft for public review and feedback
 - Held public hearing at which 41 individuals testified on the draft BCP
 - AIB reviewed 444 pieces of written testimony and feedback submitted through email or a Google Form

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Ongoing Community Engagement with Implementing the BCP

- Advisory Committees
 - Four committees focused on Pillars 1-4
 - Meetings held at least once each quarter and livestreamed to the public
- Outcome Measures Workgroup
 - 10 meetings in Phase One; Phase Two begins in October
 - Meetings are livestreamed to the public and available through AIB website
- Public comment at AIB meetings
- Solicit written feedback/recommendations on State and local Blueprint Implementation Plans
- Solicit written feedback/recommendations on BCP Updates
